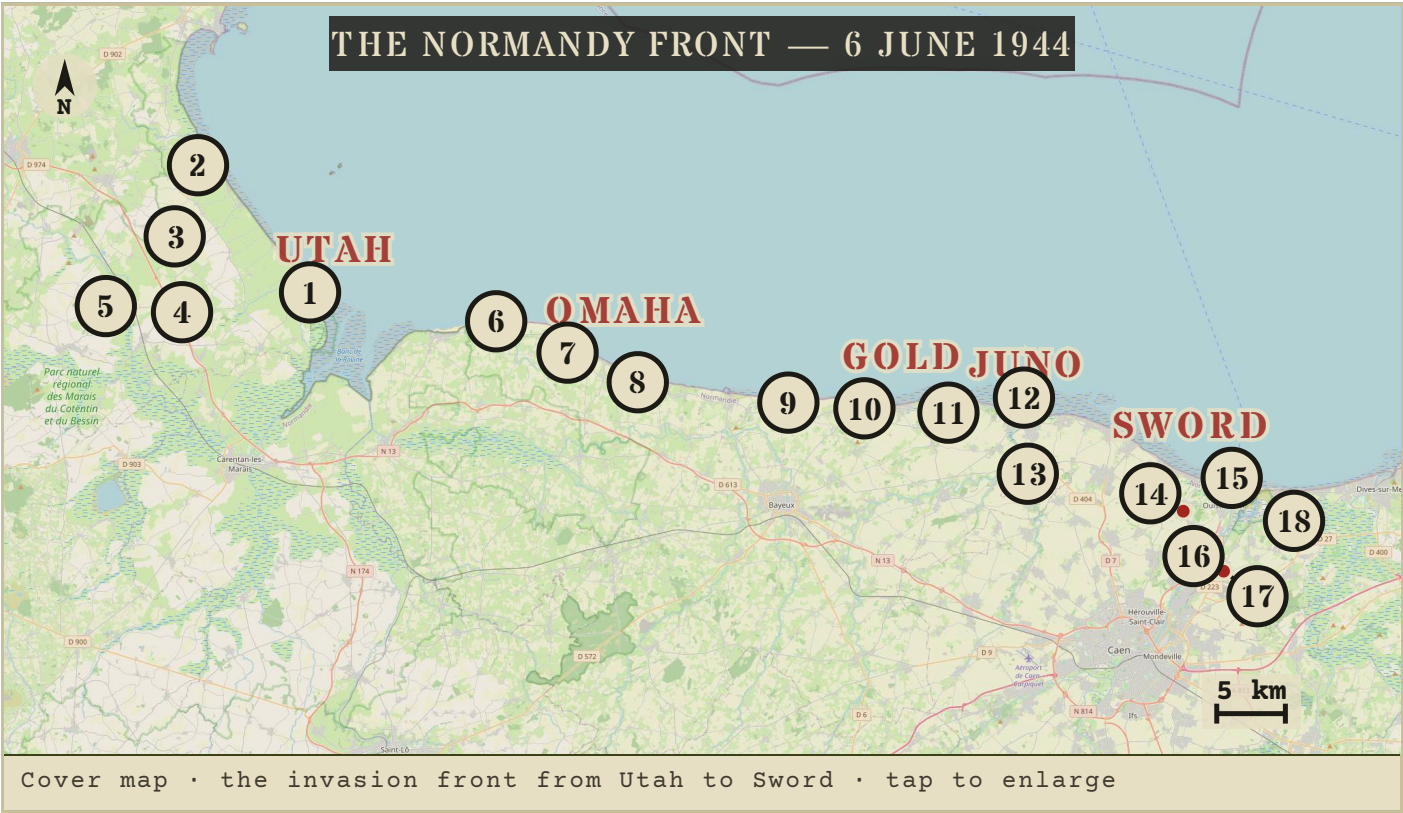

BRIEFING

ORDERS OF THE DAY · READ BEFORE MOVING OUT

This guide follows Company E, 506th Parachute Infantry, from the night drop of 6 June 1944 to the ship home on 12 July. Two sets of positions are kept apart on purpose:

TIMELINE – 21 historical positions in date order: what happened, where and when. **TOUR** – 32 stops in driving order across five days: where to go, for how long, and where to sleep. Every stop opens directly in Google Maps.

THE ACCURACY RULE

A GPS coordinate can locate a museum, memorial or town precisely; it cannot turn uncertain wartime evidence into an exact landing point. Winters himself could not identify his landing spot, so this guide never invents one. Each position carries a coloured label:

The meaning of the **HIGH / MEDIUM / LOW** labels, the **Words to know**, how to use the app, the **Origins** chapter, **The Men** (25 biographies), the **Armoury** (weapons & ammunition) and **Honor them** are the same in all three guides, so they are printed once in the separate PDF **Easy Company – Common Reference**.

Respect the ground. Brécourt Manor, Marmion Farm and several fields are private property – view from public roads and marked memorial areas. At cemeteries and memorials, remembrance first, tour second.

THE STORY IN BRIEF

The night drop. Easy Company entered Normandy in fragments. Cloud, flak and evasive flying broke up the C-47 formations and most sticks landed far from Drop Zone C near Sainte-Marie-du-Mont. Stick 66 never delivered its men: the aircraft carrying company commander 1st Lt. Thomas Meehan, 1st Sgt. William Evans and fifteen others was hit by flak and crashed near Beuzeville-au-Plain – all aboard were killed. Easy went into battle without its commander.

Assembly. 1st Lt. Richard Winters, the executive officer, came down alone somewhere west of Sainte-Mère-Église – he could never say exactly where – without his weapon. He gathered scattered men, moved round the north of the town, fell in behind Lt. Col. Cole's 502nd group, searched La Herguerie farm and reached the 2nd Battalion assembly area at Le Grand Chemin by morning – now the senior Easy officer present.

Brécourt Manor. Sent to silence a four-gun 105 mm battery believed to be firing on Utah Beach, Winters led about a dozen men in an assault often cited as a model of small-unit tactics: a base of fire, a covered approach along the hedgerow, into the trench system, and the guns reduced one by one. Reinforced by Lt. Speirs's D Company men, they destroyed the guns and withdrew.

South to Carentan. First night at Culoville near the regimental CP. 7 June: Easy on point into Vierville against German paratroopers. 7-10 June: reserve at Angoville-au-Plain. 11 June: past Dead Man's Corner, across the flooded Douve causeway and into the marsh fields. 12 June: into Carentan on the Route d'Auvers, fighting to the railway – Winters wounded in the shin. 13 June: the German counterattack at Bloody Gulch, held on the right flank until 2nd Armored tanks arrived.

The long June. Reserve in Carentan under Lt. Welsh while Winters recovered; patrols (Blithe badly wounded – his Purple Heart is dated 25 June, his 21st birthday, though accounts of the exact day and place vary); in the line until relieved 28 June; "near Cherbourg" 29 June; then the division field camp north of Utah Beach. 10-11 July back to Utah Beach to embark; Southampton on the night of 12 July, and by train to Aldbourne. Ambrose counts 65 casualties from a company of about 140.

WHY THE WIDER TOUR

Days 3-5 step outside the company to see the machine it was part of: Omaha and Pointe du Hoc, the Atlantic Wall at Longues, the Mulberry harbour, Caen, and the British airborne flank – where the Merville Battery assault is the direct twin of Brécourt.

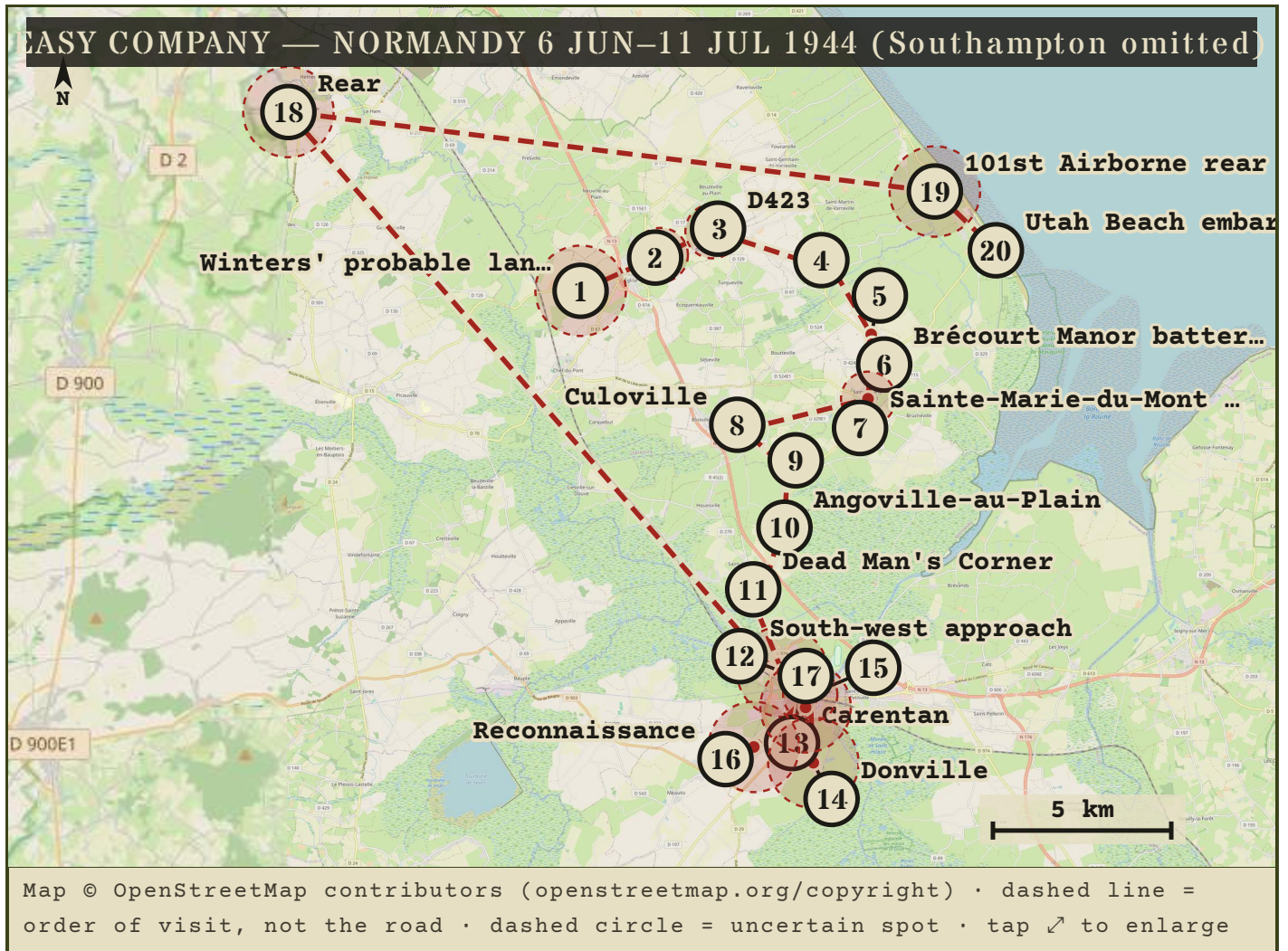
CHRONOLOGICAL MOVEMENT

PHASE 1 — D-DAY MOVEMENT

1 WINTERS' PROBABLE LANDING AREA (RECONSTRUCTION)

6 Jun 1944 ~01:30

Winters landed well off DZ (drop zone) C, west of Sainte-Mère-Église. Some researchers place it near the D15/D17 road junction, but this is a reconstruction, not a settled consensus. Treat the coordinate as the centre of a search area. He oriented himself, gathered scattered paratroopers and moved round the north side of the town toward the 506th objective.

On the ground: Understand how far he landed from the intended drop zone and the difficulty of regrouping at night. No monument — this was confusion across ordinary farmland.

Winters' growing group linked up with Easy men including Malarkey, Guarnere, Toye and Wynn in this road sector, then continued east and fell in behind Lt. Col. Cole's 502nd PIR (*Parachute Infantry Regiment*) group.

On the ground: Study the road network and distances; the pin is not an exact meeting point.

MEDIUM

A German column was ambushed in this junction area. Evidence does not support Winters personally leading the ambush. Afterwards the party continued with Cole's group toward Audouville-la-Hubert.

On the ground: Terrain and context only; exact firing positions are not asserted.

Winters and the Easy men with him searched the farm while moving toward the 506th assembly area, then returned to the road toward Le Grand Chemin.

On the ground: Rural lanes and hedgerows show the navigation problem before dawn.

Winters joined 2nd Battalion elements here. With Meehan missing he was drawn into the leadership vacuum and sent forward to investigate and neutralize artillery firing toward Utah Beach.

On the ground: The hinge of the story: the man who landed alone now has a mission, a handful of men and a concrete threat.

PRIVATE — VIEW FROM THE ROAD

The four-gun battery is firmly identified. Assault from the Le Grand Chemin side along hedgerows and trenches: base of fire, covered approach, into the trench, guns reduced one by one. The force withdrew rather than assaulting the manor. The exact geometry of every gun pit, especially the westernmost, is still debated.

On the ground: Study hedgerows, approach and battery axis from the public memorial. The battlefield is private – do not trespass.

Winters and Easy spent their first Normandy night here near the 506th command post. At first light Easy was ordered to lead the 2nd Battalion column toward Vierville.

Easy advanced on point toward Vierville and met resistance from German paratroopers. The village was cleared with support from other 506th elements and armour; movement continued south toward Angoville-au-Plain.

On the ground: This is Vierville in the Cotentin (Manche), not Vierville-sur-Mer at Omaha Beach.

Easy was pulled into reserve and security around Col. Sink's regimental command post while the attack on Carentan was prepared. On the evening of 11 June it rejoined the battalion advance.

On the ground: Visit the church – the airborne aid station where two 101st medics treated wounded of both sides; the bloodstained pews survive.

Easy passed this landmark moving south toward Carentan; it was not Easy's principal battle site that day. The company crossed the Douve causeway corridor, then left the road and moved across fields toward the south-west approach to Carentan.

On the ground: The constricted road/causeway terrain through the flooded lowlands.

Easy bivouacked in the marsh/field area near the approach to Carentan. Modern roads and development make a single exact bivouac point misleading. Before dawn on 12 June the company advanced across fields toward the town.

On the ground: Visualize the pre-dawn movement from the road network into fields toward Carentan.

Easy dug in south-west of Carentan and held the right flank during the German counterattack of 13 June (17th SS Panzergrenadier and Fallschirmjäger (*German paratroopers*) Regiment 6 elements) until armour from the 2nd Armored Division helped restore the situation. The exact hedgerow occupied is disputed.

On the ground: Treat the whole sector as the battlefield, not the pin as a foxhole. Hedgerows and restricted sightlines explain why attacks felt isolated and sudden.

Printed tour: the app's full recommended route at its standard length, day by day. In the app you can switch to the Easy-Company-only route, choose 1-7 days, and add or drop stops.

The planner ranks every site by its importance to the Easy Company story, fills your days in west-to-east driving order (about 7 hours of visits a day), and picks an overnight base for each night. Five days gives the classic tour; six or more adds the "Easy Company's June" extras.

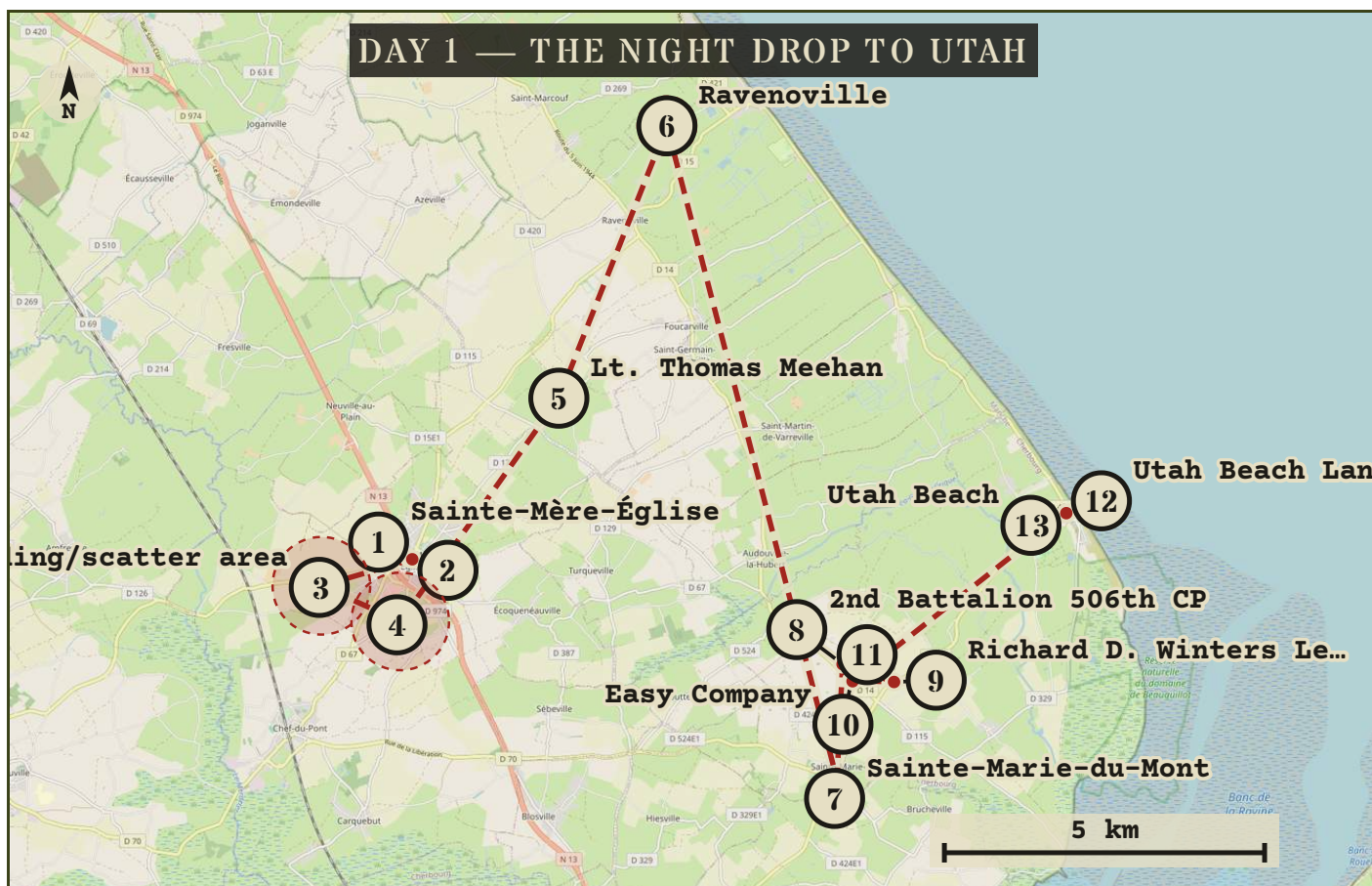

Begin in the square before the museum. The church and compact street plan make this one of Normandy's strongest orientation points for the airborne landings. Chiefly an 82nd Airborne story, but for Easy it shows the scale of the night-drop chaos.

On the ground: Look at the distances on your map rather than searching for an Easy plaque. The lesson is dispersion.

Always open. Best 08:00-09:30 or after 18:00.

Reconstruct what happened before any Easy man touched French soil: overloaded C-47s (transport plane), darkness, flak (anti-aircraft fire), jump lights, static lines and

landing alone. Aircraft, glider, uniforms and equipment make it physical.

On the ground: Give special attention to the C-47 (*transport plane*) and 101st interpretation – the best place to understand what a 'stick' meant.

A dispersion lesson, not four exact landing sites. Men landed across a broad area and assembled in improvised groups; the company that fought on 6 June was not the one that boarded in England.

On the ground: Compare the plotted points with the intended DZ (*drop zone*) C to grasp how much cohesion had to be rebuilt on the ground.

C-47 (*transport plane*) 42-93095, carrying Lt. Meehan, 1st Sgt. Evans and 15 other Easy paratroopers, was hit by flak (*anti-aircraft fire*) and crashed near Beuzeville-au-Plain. All five aircrew and 17 paratroopers were killed.

On the ground: Unlike the scatter pins, this marks a documented crash-site vicinity. The story of Winters's leadership begins partly here.

In this area Winters reached the battalion CP (*command post*), was drawn into the leadership vacuum and received the mission that led to Brécourt. Interpretive reconstruction, not a marked footprint.

On the ground: The hinge in the story.

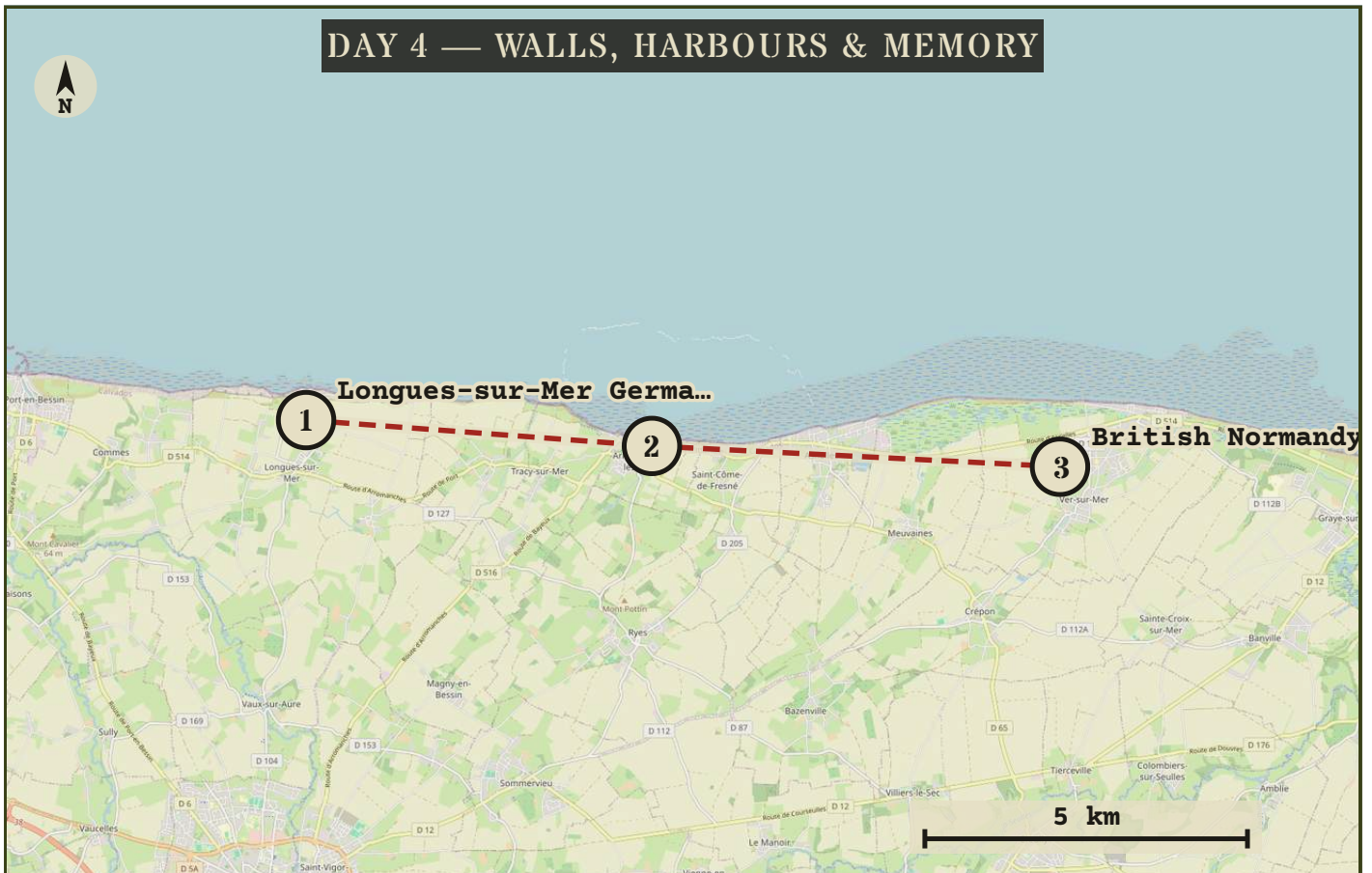

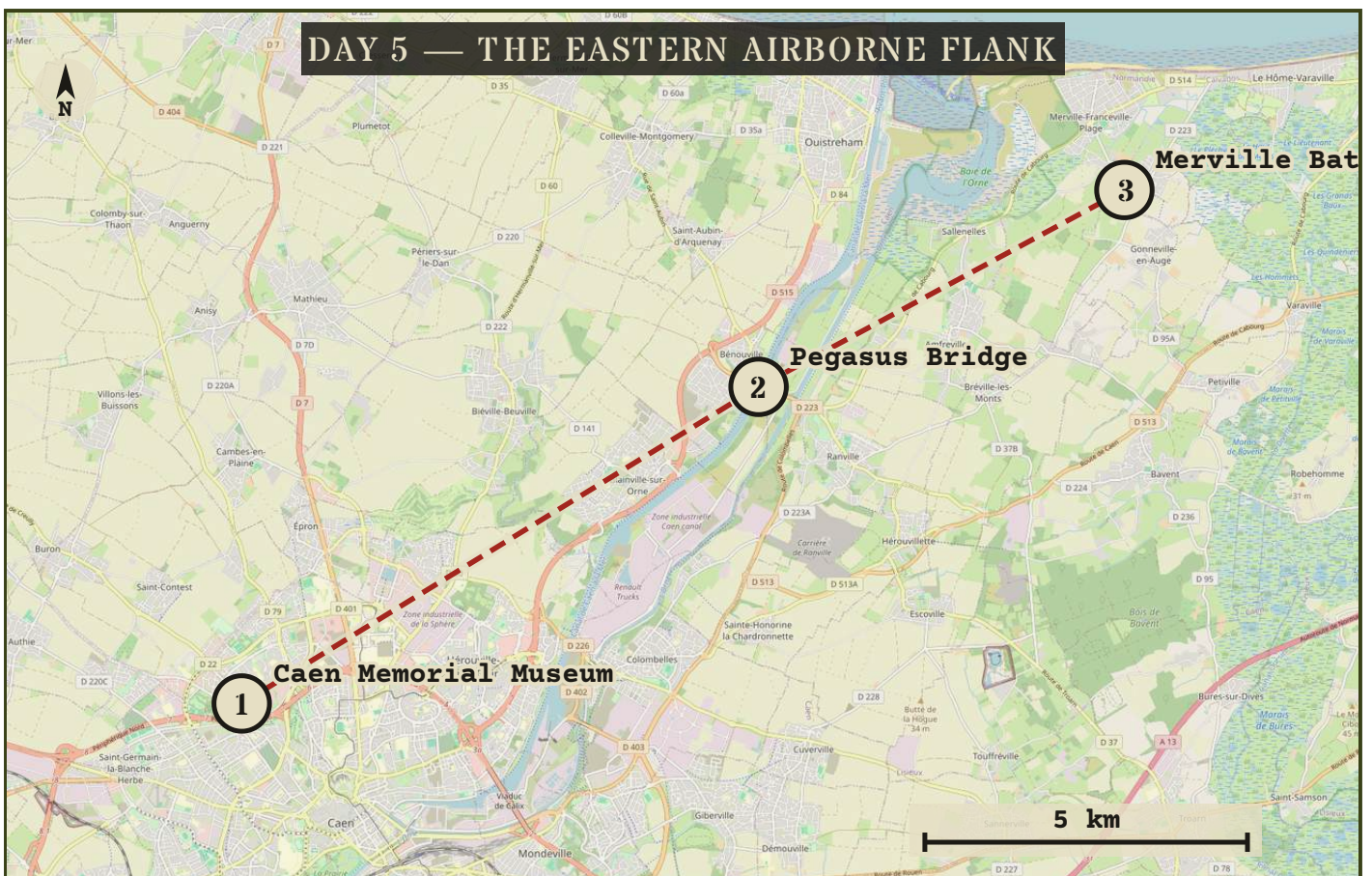

OPERATION OVERLORD — THE WHOLE INVASION

Easy Company was one rifle company among roughly 156,000 Allied troops landed on 6 June 1944. This tab gives the big picture, then runs the invasion clock side by side with what Easy was doing at the same hour.

THE DECISIVE FACTORS

THE PLAN — OVERLORD AND NEPTUNE

Five beaches on an 80 km front between the Orne and the Cotentin, three airborne divisions dropped on the flanks before dawn, and a lodgement to be built up faster than the Germans could reinforce it. Neptune was the assault phase; Overlord the campaign to break out of Normandy. Easy's regiment, the 506th, sat at the far western end of the whole scheme, behind Utah Beach.

≈156,000 troops landed on D-Day · ≈7,000 vessels · ≈11,500 aircraft sorties · 5 beaches · 3 airborne divisions

DECEPTION — OPERATION FORTITUDE

A fictional army group under Patton in south-east England, dummy landing craft, double agents and false radio traffic convinced German intelligence that the main blow would fall at the Pas-de-Calais. The German 15th Army stayed there for weeks after 6 June — one important reason, alongside German command paralysis, Allied air power and wrecked transport, why the beachhead was not crushed in its first days.

German 15th Army held at Calais into July

WEATHER — THE 24-HOUR POSTPONEMENT

Planned for 5 June, the landings were postponed a day when a storm blew in. Group Captain Stagg's forecast of a brief window on the 6th let Eisenhower say 'OK, let's go'. The Germans, reading the same weather, stood down: Rommel was in Germany for his wife's birthday. The wind also scattered the airborne drops — including Easy's.

Decision: 04:15, 5 June · low tide + moonlight window: 5-7 June

THE GERMAN DEFENCE

Rommel's Atlantic Wall: beach obstacles, mined foreshore, resistance nests, and inland flooding of the Douve and Merderet valleys to drown paratroopers and channel movement. Behind Utah stood the 709th and 91st Divisions and Fallschirmjäger Regiment 6 – Easy's opponents from Brécourt to Carentan. The panzer reserve, held back by Hitler, could not move until the afternoon of 6 June.

Utah sector: 709th Inf. Div., 91st Luftlande Div., FJR 6 • Omaha: 352nd Inf. Div.

THE AIRBORNE ASSAULT

Mission Albany (101st) and Boston (82nd) in the west, Tonga (British 6th) in the east: about 23,000 men by parachute and glider. Cloud, flak and evasive flying scattered the Americans across the Cotentin – the confusion that cost Easy its commander and made Winters's D-Day. The scatter also confused the Germans, who could not tell where the main drop was.

101st: DZs A, C, D behind Utah • 82nd: Sainte-Mère-Église and the Merderet • 6th: Orne bridges and Merville

THE BEACHES — FIVE VERY DIFFERENT BATTLES

Utah: 4th Division ashore on the wrong beach, lightly opposed, ≈200 casualties – because the airborne had the exits and the guns (Brécourt among them) were being silenced. Omaha: bluffs, the 352nd Division and no working armour – ≈2,400 casualties and a crisis until noon. Gold, Juno and Sword: British and Canadian landings that reached furthest inland, though Caen was not taken.

H-Hour: Utah/Omaha 06:30 • Gold 07:25 • Sword 07:25 • Juno 07:45–07:55

NAVAL AND AIR POWER

Battleships and cruisers bombarded the coast from 05:30; thousands of bombers hit batteries and beaches (missing most of Omaha's defences in the cloud). Allied air supremacy meant the Luftwaffe barely appeared and German reinforcements moved only at night – which is why German formations arrived piecemeal and the concentrated counter-blows the invasion plan feared never came.

Bombardment from 05:30 • Rangers scaled Pointe du Hoc at 07:10

LOGISTICS — THE ARTIFICIAL HARBOURS

Two prefabricated Mulberry harbours were towed across the Channel and working within days. The great storm of 19–22 June wrecked the American one at Omaha; the British harbour at Arromanches carried on. Fuel came ashore in tankers, jerrycans and short shore pipelines; the first cross-Channel PLUTO line was not laid until August and mattered only after Normandy. The build-up race was won by supply as much as by fighting.

Arromanches harbour: ≈2.5 million men, 500,000 vehicles and 4 million tons of supplies over its ten months of operation (not the Normandy campaign alone)

THE CAMPAIGN AFTER D-DAY

Carentan (12 June) joined Utah to Omaha; the Cotentin was cut on 18 June and Cherbourg fell on 26-27 June; Caen was finally cleared in July; Operation Cobra broke out on 25 July and the Falaise pocket closed on 21 August. Paris was liberated on 25 August. Easy Company was back in England by then, rebuilding for Holland.

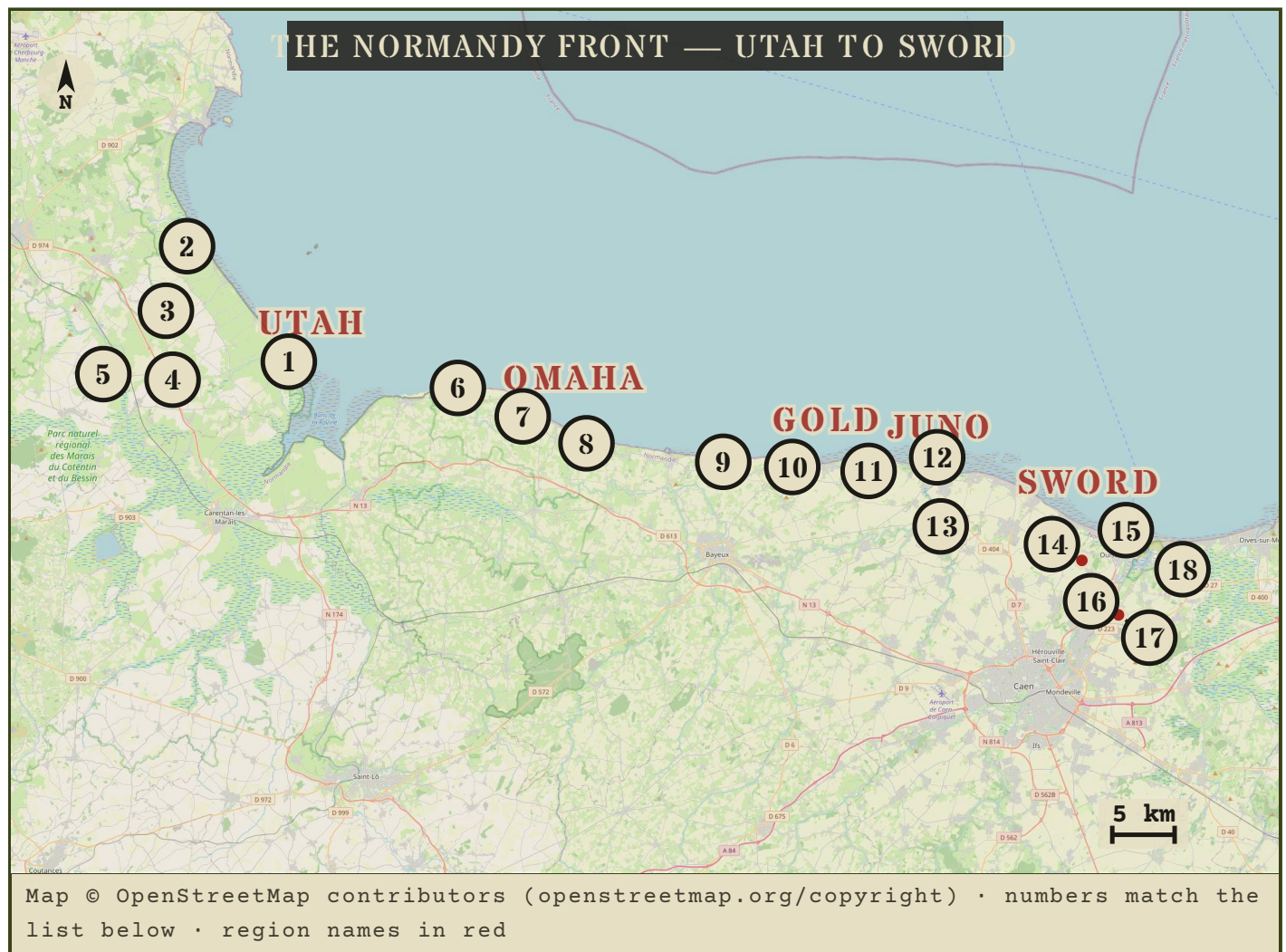
